DECISION-MAKING

My dear confreres,

As we are already in the third month of the new academic year, I thought that it would be good to reflect with this month on the process of 'Decision Making'. Decision-making is an integral part of every organization. This is equally true even for us who live in religious communities. All of us make many decisions every day. And those of us in authority have the responsibility of making decisions that can affect the life and mission of those who live and work around us.

In the concluding paragraphs of his letter to the Congregation found in the recent ACTS No. 427, the Rector Major says that "we are being called to give priority and centrality, in practice, in our decisions to the Salesian Mission for the poorest and most needy..., for those who because they do not have a voice, need our voice and our options on their behalf". Therefore, in this Circular, I would like to reflect with you how we can, as a community, make collaborative decisions which will in the long run bear much fruit, both for ourselves as well as for our mission with and for the young.

What is Decision-Making?

Decision Making



A decision can be defined as a course of action purposely chosen from a set of alternatives to achieve organizational or managerial objectives or goals. A decision is an act of selection or choice of one action from several alternatives. Decision making process is a continuous and indispensable component of managing any organization or business activities. Decisions are made to sustain the activities of all business activities and organizational functioning. Decision-making can be defined as the process of selecting a right and effective course of action from two or more alternatives for the purpose of achieving a desired result. Decision-making is the essence of any management.

Decision-Making in Society Today

I am sure we are quite familiar with these generally four major types of decision-making style that a leader adopts to get the group goals accomplished. They are:

- **1. Collective Decision Making:** Under this leadership style, all the group members take the decision collectively, and the responsibility of such decision rests with the entire group.
- **2. Democratic or Participative Decision Making:** Here, the leader collects all the ideas and opinions from the group members and then takes the final decision. Once the leader has taken the decision, he communicates the same to his subordinates and tries to resolve the objections if any.
- **3. Autocratic Participative Decision Making:** Under this leadership style, the authority of final decision making rests with the leader alone, who makes decisions on the basis of the solutions obtained through the discussions with all or some of the group members.
- **4. Consensus Decision Making:** Under this style, the leader consults everyone and seeks the opinion of everyone. All are made to look into the pros and cons of every suggestion and finally the decision is made by the entire group on a consensus basis. Generally, the group members are involved in setting goals, problem-solving, and team building. But the authority of final decision-making rests with the leader himself.

Decision-Making in the History of the Church

At the Council of Jerusalem in the first century, when a decision was necessary regarding the requirements for admission of Gentiles to the church, the Acts of the Apostles reports that the whole assembly of believers was summoned. Amid "much debate," the leaders presented their position and agreement was reached "with the consent of the whole church." The early second-century document, the *Didache*, calls on the full community "to elect for yourselves bishops and deacons." This direct selection of leaders would become a staple of church practice for many centuries.

In the third century, Cyprian, the bishop of Carthage, followed **the practice of consulting** priests and deacons on all decisions and involving the whole community in selecting new priests and deacons. He said the procedure was a matter of "divine authority" and an essential of tradition "from the beginning." In the fourth century following the Council of Nicea, a great dispute arose, with the majority of bishops holding that Jesus was not God and the majority of laity maintaining he was divine. The dispute was settled after about 60 years, with the laity position becoming the accepted doctrine. John Henry Newman in the 19th century used the phrases "consensus of the faithful" and "sense of the faithful," insisting that the post-Nicene experience indicates the Holy Spirit dwells in the full body of the church, not just in the leaders.

By the fifth century, bishops were making decisions more unilaterally, like monarchs. Still, the ecumenical Council of Chalcedon tried to preserve the older, participative system. It declared that if any bishop should presume to ordain a priest who had not been chosen by a community, the ordination would be both illegal and invalid.

As centuries passed, decision-making became more centralized in the hierarchy, but the laity still participated in many areas. A respected historian of the Middle Ages, Brian Tierney, observed, "Christian texts are filled with a sense of community meetings, community sharing, community participation in decisions." This reflects, he said, a strong belief that the consensus of the Christian people indicates the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Laity attended many ecumenical councils and even participated in some.

In the 20th century, the Second Vatican Council said a lot about the laity: that "they too share in the priestly, prophetic and royal office of Christ and therefore have their own role to play in the mission of the whole People of God ... that laypersons, by reason of ... knowledge, competence or outstanding

ability ... [are] permitted to and sometimes even obliged to express opinions on things which concern the good of the Church."

Decision-Making in the History of the Salesian Congregation

In the first chapter of his life of St. John Bosco, F.A. Forbes writes of the making of an apostle, and pays great tribute to the mother of our Saint, who "was a notable woman, one of the heroic company of Catholic wives and mothers who carry the great ideals of their faith into the smallest things of life." In his following chapter the author speaks of the moments of doubt and hesitation that occurred in the career of Don Bosco as they do in most vocations to the priesthood. The candidate is struck with a sense of his own unworthiness and passes through a period which the tempter often uses "to suggest that such a high calling is beyond the strength of mortal man, that human nature is weak, and that a good life in the world is safer and more wholesome." Such a period came to John as to others. He feared his own weakness, and had a deep sense of his own unworthiness. He consulted his confessor, but he was told: "In the matter of vocation everyone must follow his own inclinations." John was drawn toward the Franciscans and the Dominicans and felt that his eternal salvation would be safer in a religious Order than in the secular priesthood.

When he consulted his mother, always his wise advisor, she demurred and said, "The only thing I want of you is the salvation of your soul. Follow God's will." After praying over the matter John resolved to enter the Franciscans. At this point he was advised to consult Don Cafasso, a saintly young priest who had the gift of guiding souls. His advisor did not hesitate: John should enter the secular priesthood. "Go on studying," he said, "then to the seminary, and there hold yourself in readiness to follow the guidance of God's grace." John made his final decision in response to this advice of a holy man who was to have a great part in the career of the young seminarian. Donning his cassock, he at once took up his studies. His biographer says that he was the most popular boy in the college, first in his class, athlete, musician, everybody's friend, always ready to do a good turn to anyone, a potent influence for good.

In 1857, Don Bosco had a meeting with Interior Minister Ratazzi, anti-clerical government minister, but admirer of Don Bosco's work. He suggested to Don Bosco that he should be thinking of founding a society to carry on his work! This had been in Don Bosco's mind for a while, and after a few false starts, he realised his best chance was to train his older pupils who loved him and would be prepared to work for him. On January 26th 1854, the project for a religious order took its first proper steps. Don Bosco gathered four young men, including Michael Rua and John Cagliero, and bound them by promise to live good lives and practice charity to all. Formal vows might come later. Don Bosco called them "Salesians" after St Francis De Sales whom he admired greatly. Over the next five years, there were regular meetings. Some of the young men donned the clerical habit and took vows.

On December 13th 1859 the Salesian Congregation was finally born. Eighteen young men signed the first official document and act of the Salesian Society. A Superior Chapter was elected and began the function of governing and expanding the new Society.

During this period of expansion, it crossed Don Bosco's mind a number of times that a congregation of women was needed to do the same kind of work with girls. Fr. Dominic Pestarino, pastor of the village of Mornese, had in his parish a pious union of women known as the "Daughters of Mary Immaculate", who wanted to live a more dedicated life and help to care for young girls. In 1862 Fr. Pestarino visited the Oratory and was impressed by Don Bosco. In 1864 Don Bosco came to Mornese and Mary Mazzarello met him for the first time.

Another three years passed before, in 1867, Don Bosco met the Daughters of Mary Immaculate as a group and **shared his vision with them**. In 1871, **after consulting his General Council**, Don Bosco decided to found a congregation of women to work for girls. On August 5th 1872 Mary Mazzarello and her group pronounced their vows as Daughters of Mary Help of Christians, with Mary as the Superior.

The Biblical Model of Decision Making

First pray about the decision. Ask God for His will to be accomplished in your life. Ask Him for wisdom to make the right decision. Praise Him for guidance to make the right decision. Ask others to pray with you. Study the Scriptures and as you study claim the promises for direction given in the written Word of God. Listen to the inner voice of the Holy Spirit as He speaks God's will into your heart. Acknowledge supernatural revelation, should God choose to send it. These might include dreams, visions, angels, an audible voice from God, or other special forms of guidance in harmony with God's Word. When you are about to make any important decision and you do not have peace in your spirit, continue to seek the Lord day and night in personal prayer. Do not make a final decision until you have the peace of God confirming your choice. Above all **never be in a hurry**.

Wait on the Lord; be of good courage, and He shall strengthen thine heart: wait, I say, on the Lord. (Psalms 27:14)

My soul, wait thou only upon God; for my expectation is from him. (Psalms 62:5)

Rest in the Lord, and wait patiently for Him . . . (Psalms 37:7)

But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint. (Isaiah 40:31)

Saul was in a hurry and made a decision which cost him the kingdom (1 Samuel 13). Nehemiah waited for direction from God and the right timing, and he became part of the rebuilding of a kingdom.

From 1 Chronicles 12:32, we find two key prerequisites for good decision making: **awareness and decisiveness.** Good decisions require adequate information and careful analysis of all of the pertinent facts. Although there is a place for spontaneity, important decisions generally should not be rushed, since they require sufficient time for gestation. But, once made, such decisions should be decisively communicated and implemented. At the end of the day, we all have to make choices, and once those choices are made, we have to live with them. This was Hamlet's difficulty – determining a course of action – as evidenced through his lines from the famous "**To be or not to be**" speech.

Decision makers must understand complicated matters, but they also need God's perspective in deciding how to act. A leader must develop a disciplined and prudent character so that he or she will do what is right and just and fair. The rub comes when the leader doesn't know what is just and right and fair — or when any conceivable decision appears unjust, wrong and unfair. That's why Solomon cautioned that the unsophisticated need prudence. The young need knowledge and discretion. In fact, everyone needs to foster learning and seek guidance on a daily basis. The Author Bill Hybels writes: Human judgment is always limited and sometimes wrong. Sometimes our best notions about what ought to be said or done are ill-advised, dangerous, even destructive. When it comes to the key decisions in our lives, we almost always need deeper insights and a broader perspective than mere human wisdom can offer us. A helpful spiritual rule of thumb might be "When in doubt, always, always, always trust the wisdom of God."

No decision is wise if it's made independently of God. In Joshua 9, the people of Israel made a terrible decision because they left God out of their plans, and had to live with the consequences of a decision which God did not approve. The Apostle James spoke of this very same issue when he wrote, "You ought to say, 'If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that" (James 4:15). You and I are never

free from God. We must make our decisions in submission to His sovereign will. Ronald Reagan is credited with saying, "America was founded by people who believed that God was their rock of safety. He is ours. I recognize we must be cautious in claiming that God is on our side, but I think it's all right to keep asking if we're on His side." If we unthinkingly assume that God is always on our side, we will fall headlong into foolishness. We should search ourselves regularly to make sure our thinking is in line with his will. We should strive to develop the character and conviction to make decisions that are products of our relationship with God.

Conclusion

In union with the whole Church, on the 15th of August, we celebrate the Assumption of Our Lady, body and soul, into the glory of heaven. Mary's Assumption shows us our own destiny as God's adoptive children and members of the body of Christ. Like Mary our Mother, we are called to share fully in the Lord's victory over sin and death, and to reign with him in his eternal Kingdom. This is our vocation.

Pope Pius XII defined and promulgated the Dogma of Assumption of Mary on the occasion of the year of the Great Jubilee (1950) through the Apostolic Constitution, *Munficentissimus Deus* (The Most Bountiful God) in the following words: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divine dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her

earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." The same doctrine was officially once again confirmed by the Second Vatican Council in its dogmatic constitution, *Lumen Gentium* (The Light of the peoples), No 59.

Reflecting on decision-making, as we celebrate our country's Independence Day, we may think of freedom as the ability to decide the what, when, who, and why of our lives. However, for us, freedom does not equal individual autonomy or individual liberty, or the power to choose. So what does true freedom mean? God freely created human beings. And because we were created in the image and likeness of God, we have a share in God's freedom. Therefore, freedom is both a gift and a virtue. The New Testament writers understood freedom as not being free to do whatever one chooses but to be free from sin and death (see Gal 5:1). It is the community in which we live and work that provides the environment and support in which we can be free from sin and selfishness. Freedom is the power to choose to do what is good. In other words, freedom is hard work – it requires ongoing conversion, a life of discipleship. No matter our circumstances, gifts, talents, and skills, each and every one of us can use our freedom in God's service and participate in God's ongoing work of creation and redemption, right where we are!

My dear confreres, a true spirit of freedom is the antidote to the spirit of despair that seems to grow like a cancer in individuals who are outwardly comfortable, yet often experience inner sadness and emptiness. Upon how many of our young has this despair taken its toll! May they, the young who surround us in these days with their joy and confidence, never be robbed of their hope!

It is gratifying to note that Mary stands as 'an image of the Church as well as a sign of sure hope and comfort to the people of God in pilgrimage.' LG 68. Let us turn to Our Lady and implore the grace to rejoice in the freedom of the children of God, to use that freedom wisely in the service of our brothers and sisters, and to live and work as signs of the hope which will find its fulfillment in that eternal Kingdom where to reign is to serve. On this auspicious occasion, let us pledge to love our country, work unitedly for its progress and ensure violence free living. Like Mary, who was a woman for others, let us practise works of mercy and joyously serve our less fortunate brethren.
